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I. Framework & Policy

Under the guidance and vision of the Hon'ble Chairman sir and ED sir, a comprehensive and structured Placement Policy was designed for the Career Services Office. A well-defined framework was established to govern all career services activities in a systematic and disciplined manner. The policy clearly outlined detailed processes, including opportunity workflows, student eligibility norms, and participation mechanisms. Structured opt-in and opt-out forms were designed to ensure transparency and informed student participation. The policy aimed to create a secure, fair, and accountable placement ecosystem. The entire framework and policy were communicated to students through dedicated orientation sessions to ensure clarity, awareness, and compliance.

Sample placement policy is also enclosed as annexure (a) for your ready reference.

II. Team Formation & Structure

A structured team was formed to ensure effective Planning, Monitoring, and Execution of Career Services activities. At the guidance level, the Hon'ble Chairman and the Executive Director provided strategic direction and oversight. For institutional monitoring, a multi-layered structure was established comprising Faculty Placement Coordinators (FPCs), the Dean – CS, Dean – Management, and the Principal, ensuring academic and operational alignment. For execution and ground-level implementation, Student Placement Coordinators (SPCs) were appointed across programs. SPCs played a key role in managing communication, information flow, and student coordination, while also representing student interests and leadership. Regular monthly meetings between FPCs and SPCs were conducted to review progress and deliberate on future plans and initiatives.

III. Launch of Employability Calendar

To systematically enhance students' employability skills and provide structured, job-oriented training, the Employability Calendar was launched under the guidance of the Hon'ble Chairman. The calendar was designed as a year-long roadmap aligned with academic progression and placement readiness. A total of 41 job-oriented training interventions were planned, including 14 trainings for the 2025 graduating batch, 15 trainings for the 2026 graduating batch, and 12 trainings for the 2027 graduating batch. Each activity was carefully scheduled in alignment with students' academic timelines to ensure progressive skill development. This structured approach ensured continuous preparation rather than last-minute placement readiness. Notably, Podar College stands as the only institution in the region to have launched such a comprehensive and structured Employability Calendar for its students.

IV. Employability Trainings

Under the structured framework of the Employability Calendar, 41 job-oriented employability training programs were planned and executed across graduating batches. The trainings covered key employability areas such as communication skills, aptitude, technical readiness, domain orientation, resume writing, interview preparedness, and workplace ethics. Continuous participation tracking, feedback collection, and performance monitoring were implemented to measure training effectiveness and student improvement.

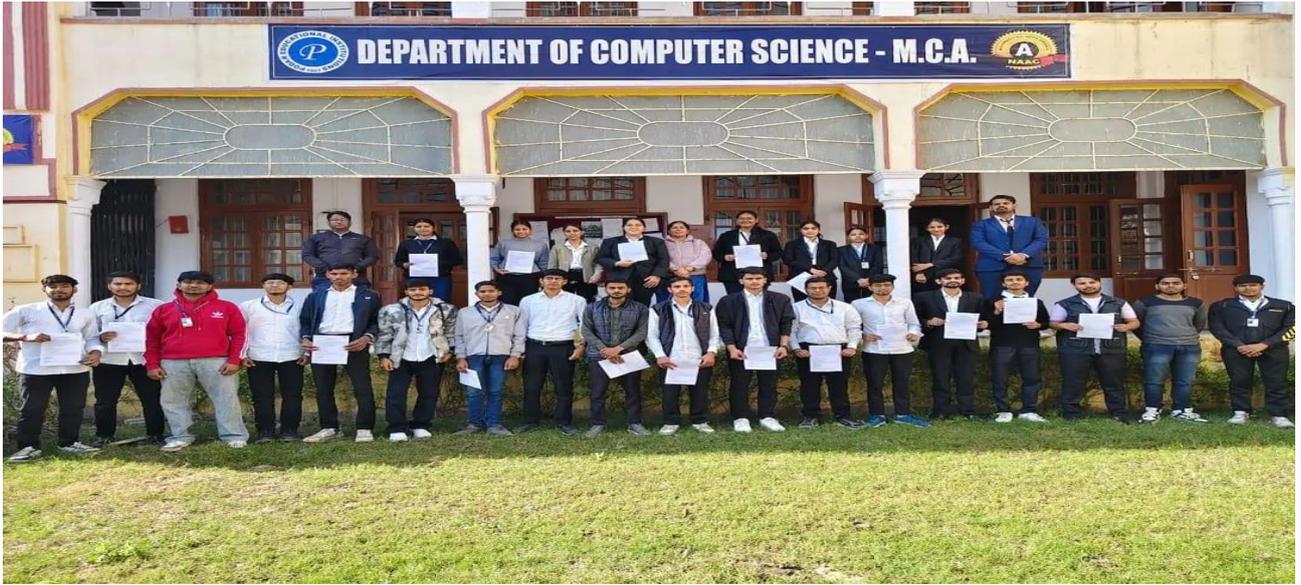

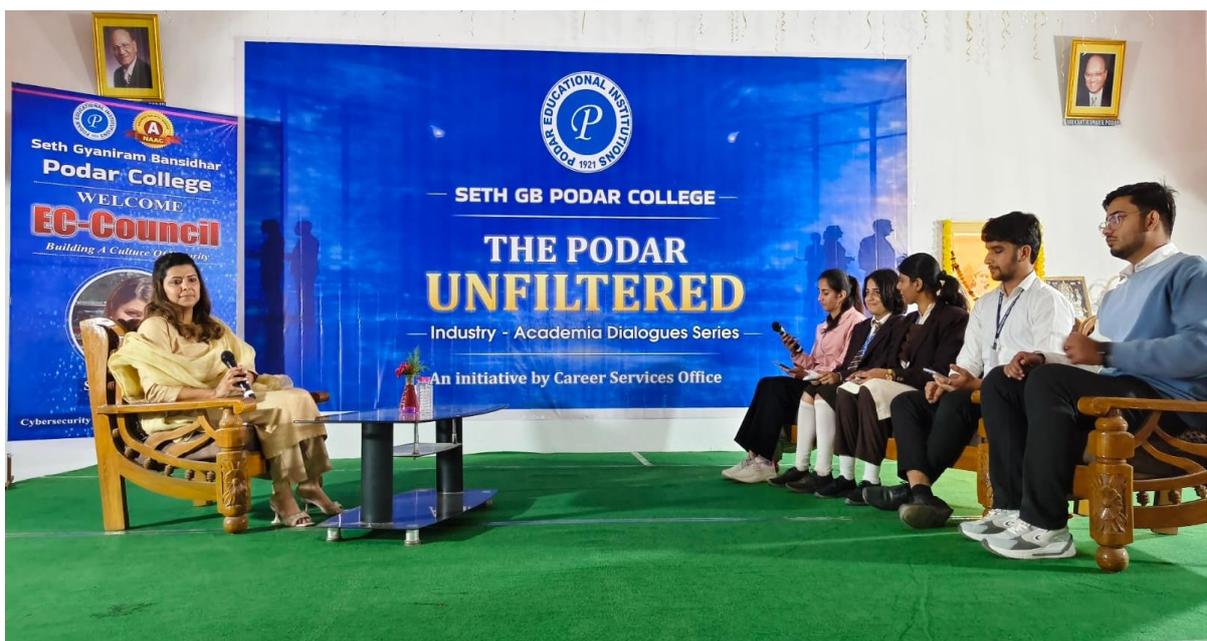

Annexure (a) –PLACEMENT POLICY

PODAR PLACEMENT POLICY

B1: Preamble

The placement for any Institute is an important parameter, which reflects on the academic rigor, overall development of the student and ranking of the Institute. It also serves as a motivating factor for prospective students to seek admission in a particular Institute.

The placement manual will enable the placement activities to be in discipline and transparent manner. This may also assist in enhancing the quality of Placements. The Manual should be reviewed and suitably modified periodically.

B2: Process Guidelines

The activity schedule with timeline for MBA / BBA / BCA / MCA students are as follows:

Activity Timeline

The number of students in Placement Committee will depend on the size of the Batch / Program.

1. CV / Portfolio submission by students Jan
2. Employability assessment and training sessions Dec onwards
3. Placement drives May-June-July onwards
4. Engagement with Recruiters / Alumni: Feb onwards

Engagement with Recruiters / Industry Experts / Alumni could be through the following activities:

- Guest Lectures

- Summits
- Specific electives to be taken by recruiters
- Workshops
- Mock interview sessions
- Industry visits by faculties / students
- Placement assistance
- Live Projects
- Career counselling
- Sponsorships / monetary contribution to the institute

B3: Policy & 15 Rule

1. General Eligibility Criteria

- a. Registered students who have completed the requirement of their academic registration and are expected to complete their graduation by 2025, 2026, 2027.
- b. The student does not have any backlog on the date of Placement Registration.

2. The last date to register for placements is 30 Dec 2024 (for 2025 graduating students). Students need to fill career opportunity form (Annexure-I) and share their soft copy of updated CV in standard format with Career Services office before 30 Dec 2024. All unregistered students will be considered opted out from the placement process.

3. If a student decides to opt out from the selection process at any time of the final year, then he/she should submit the placement opt out form (Annexure-II) to the Career Services office.

4. Already placed student will remain eligible to avail additional placement opportunities in case the CTC offered is at least 30% more than his / her last offered CTC.

5. The decision to apply or not, by the eligible students will purely be their own. However, if any eligible student decides not to apply to Five companies in continuation, without prior approval, he/she will be debarred from the placement process of the Institute.

6. It will be mandatory for all short-listed students to appear for the selection process/interview. Any withdrawal / no-show, without approval will debar the student from placement assistance of the Institute.

7. Attendance in pre-placement talks, personality development, preparatory classes (including mock interviews) and employability tests being conducted throughout their course duration is compulsory for all the students. Minimum 75% of attendance is mandatory else, student will be considered disqualified for the placement support activities.

8. Career Services Office will be sending all communication related to placement through official channels (Mail/WhatsApp Groups/Meetings/In-person) only. It is the onus of every registered student to check their email/WhatsApp Groups regularly and comply with announced deadlines. No late applications / requests will be entertained.
9. If needed, screening of students can be done by the Career Services Office on the basis of CGPA or faculty recommendations, Assessments result and attendance in Career Services activities.
10. Career Services Office will be responsible to the registered students only; those who Submitted Opt-in format. Students who will not submit their opt-in or out form will be considered Placement Opt-Out with effect from 1 Jan 2025 onwards.
11. The student must strictly follow the guidelines of Placement.
12. Minimum CTC for 2025 graduating students will starts from 2.5 LPA upwards
13. Eligible & registered students are expected to be open for Sector, Job role, CTC and Location of the Job opportunities.
14. Career services Office will take decision in the view of entire batch & strength of students. No specific requests will be entertained.
15. Guidelines in this policy manual for Placement and Internships can be modified by Career services Committee as per the futuristic need with the approval of competent authority.

- **Skills:** Key technical and soft skills relevant to the job being applied for.
- **Education:** List of degrees and certifications.
- **Additional Sections (Optional):** Certifications, awards, volunteer work, publications, etc.

3. Common Resume Mistakes to Avoid

- Anil Sir pointed out the importance of **avoiding generic resumes**. Resumes should be tailored to the specific role and company.
- Michael emphasized not **overloading the resume with unnecessary personal information** (e.g., age, marital status).
- Emily noted the significance of proofreading to avoid **spelling or grammatical errors**, which can lead to a negative first impression.

4. Open Discussion and Q&A

- **Mark** asked about the best way to handle **gaps in employment**. John suggested explaining employment gaps with a brief, positive statement, focusing on skills gained during that time (e.g., freelance work, further education).
- **Emily** asked for tips on formatting and layout. Anil sir recommended using **professional templates** but advised avoiding overly complex designs.

1. Amul Dairy, Jaipur

Amul is one of India's largest and most trusted dairy cooperatives. During the visit to Amul Dairy, we learned about the complete milk processing cycle. Key observations included:

- **Milk Collection & Supply:** Amul collects milk from thousands of rural farmers daily. The milk is transported through refrigerated vans to maintain hygiene and freshness.
- **Temperature Maintenance:** The milk is stored and processed at controlled low temperatures (around 4°C) using advanced cooling systems to prevent bacterial growth.
- **Nutritional Value:** Amul milk contains essential nutrients such as Vitamin A, D, calcium, and protein, which are crucial for health.

- **Learning:** We gained insights into supply chain management, food safety standards, quality control, and large-scale automation in dairy processing.

2. Bhamashah Techno Hub, Jaipur

Bhamashah Techno Hub is India's biggest startup incubation centre. It supports aspiring entrepreneurs and tech startups through funding, mentorship, and infrastructure.

- **Startup Ecosystem:** The hub provides workspace, technical support, and networking opportunities to young innovators.
- **Technology Exposure:** We explored various new-age technologies like AI, IoT, Blockchain, and AR/VR being used by startups.
- **Business Idea Funding:** If a student or entrepreneur presents an innovative and viable business idea, the hub provides funding and mentoring after selection.
- **Learning:** This visit taught us about entrepreneurship, business incubation, startup culture, and government support for innovation.

3. VFS Global, Jaipur

VFS Global is a global outsourcing and technology services specialist for governments and diplomatic missions worldwide.

- **Core Function:** The company manages administrative tasks related to visa, passport, and consular services, but the final decision is always made by the respective embassies.
- **Process Management:** VFS ensures smooth document verification, biometric data collection, and appointment management.
- **Technology Use:** They use secure digital systems and biometrics to maintain data privacy and operational efficiency.
- **Learning:** We understood the importance of backend support systems in international travel, customer service, data management, and government collaboration.

Seth G. B. Podar College, Nawalgarh successfully hosted the second edition of *The Podar Unfiltered – Podar Industry Dialogues Series* on **6th February 2026**, further strengthening the institution's commitment to meaningful and future-focused industry–academia engagement.

The institution was privileged to welcome **Ms. Shilpi Gautam, India Head – EC-Council**, the world's largest and most respected organization in the field of cybersecurity education, certification, and workforce development. Her presence added global relevance and strong industry credibility to the series.

Approximately **149 students** participated in this dialogue, including students from **PIMS, GPS, and for the first time, students of Grades 10, 11, and 12 from our Podar School (GPS)**, marking a significant expansion of the initiative's reach.

The interaction kept the auditorium fully engaged and reflected the true spirit of The Podar Unfiltered — transparent, interactive, and student-driven.

All questions raised during the panel discussion and open house session were carefully recorded and documented by two members of the SPC (Student Placement Coordinator) team. Future editions will proactively include participation from **school, undergraduate, and postgraduate streams**, further strengthening the initiative as a comprehensive **Campus-Level Industry Dialogue**.

4. **Focused thematic events (such as cybersecurity, salesforce, fintech)** generate deeper engagement and more relevant questions compared to generic industry talks, suggesting the value of domain-specific dialogue formats.
5. A repository of *The Podar Unfiltered* sessions will be gradually developed in **digital format**, creating a long-term institutional knowledge asset.
6. Event branding elements such as banners, standees, and stage visuals will be **standardized** to maintain consistency and professional presentation.
7. Coordination with school leadership and academic teams will be strengthened to **systematically integrate school student participation** in relevant future editions.
8. A **formal mechanism for capturing student feedback** will be introduced to assess learning effectiveness and continuously refine the event format.
9. Key discussion points and insights from each session will be **compiled into post-event learning summaries** and shared with a wider student audience.

11. A post-event **thank-you and engagement follow-up framework** will be institutionalized to nurture long-term relationships with industry partners.
